THE OLD GIRLS' ASSOCIATION.

CONSTITUTION AND RULES.

The Society shall be called "The Old Girls' Association of the Oldham Hulme Grammar School for Girls."

The President shall be the acting Head Mistress of the School, and the Secretary shall be one of the members of the School Staff.

The affairs of the Association shall be conducted by a Committee, consisting of the President, the Secretary and Treasurer, and fifteen representative members, of whom fourteen shall be elected by the Old Girls and one by the members of Form Upper VI. Of the 14 Old Girls' representatives, two shall retire annually in rotation, but they shall be eligible for re-election, and the election shall take place at the December meeting.

Members who, without good cause assigned, absent themselves from committee meetings for two consecutive years, shall be considered to have resigned, and their places shall be filled up at the December meeting held at the end of the second year during

which they were absent from the meetings.

Full members (i.c. girls who are able to attend the meetings) shall pay a yearly subscription of 2s. Country members shall pay 1s. Both subscriptions will include the Record.

All subscriptions are due in December, and no notices of meetings will be sent to any member whose subscription is two

years in arrears.

There shall be two meetings of the Association each year—on the first Thursday in December and the first Thursday in July, with the exception that in alternate years, a picnic on the first Saturday in July shall take the place of the summer meeting.

During the last week in November each member shall send to the Secretary at least one warm useful garment for the poor.

Old clothes are also welcome.

The Record shall be issued during the Spring Term, and shall be sent to all members who have paid their subscriptions.

May Day, 1905, was a great day for the girlhood of Oldham, for on that date the Hulme Grammar School for Girls began its work of unsealing the fountain of knowledge for those who, acting on the advice of their forefathers, dared to be wise. But Oldham had lived for so many generations without a school of this type, that at first its girls did not know that the education it affords is planned to go on up to the ages of eighteen and nineteen. Consequently many brought their school life to a premature end and left at sixteen very incompletely educated, but at least with a great love for the school where a new life had begun for them. in four short years, quite an appreciable number were already saying, "I wish I had not left so soon," and Speech Days found them hurrying along Chamber Road eager to greet old friends in the old place once more. Young then, as was the school itself, it was plain that the time had arrived for the founding of an Old Girls' Accordingly, in October, 1899 summonses were sent Association. forth to a drawing-room meeting, and the response was so great that chairs and even hassocks ran short, and the late-comers were reduced to sitting on the coal-scuttle and the floor.

Two proposals were put before the meeting and carried with

acclamation :-

1st.—That an Old Girls' Association be formed under the

Presidentship of the acting Head Mistress.

2nd.—That the object of the Association be to keep the Old Girls in touch with the school and with each other, and to unite them with the school in the fellowship of a common work for others, the work to take the form of the

production of some useful garment of warm material for the poor of the district from which we draw the revenues with which the school is endowed.

The first officers were elected and in the following December the first meeting was held. Since then the meetings have been held regularly twice a year. In the winter the Committee provides some form of entertainment which does not monopolise too great a proportion of the evening, but gives ample time for old friends to exchange news and indulge in reminiscences. Dramatic scenes have been acted for us, and dance programmes drawn up, but perhaps we have enjoyed best of all those evenings on which progressive games were played.

In the summer our meetings are held in the open-air, a picnic every alternate year taking the place of a playground gathering, at which staid matrons find themselves running up the cricket pitch, bat in hand, while others on the bank recall the prowness with which they captained their form teams in the days of long ago. As for the picnics, it is rash to boast, but Queen's weather has attended our expeditions to Chester, Haddon Hall, the Manifold Valley, Warburton and Lymm.

But in spite of our dates being the result of much anxious thought, there are many Old Girls who cannot be with us; colleges, schools, hospitals, and post offices claim the time of many, while others have left Oldham altogether. That we should not lose touch with these, we have decided to send forth each year this Record. This, the first number, promises to be a bulky one, for the obvious reason that it covers the past seventeen years; it has been made as complete as we could make it, and all omissions noted by its readers will be gladly filled in in the next number if those readers will send in any news that is lacking. The success of this new venture depends on the loyal support of the Old Girls themselves, and as editors may not invent news, we cannot too strongly impress on all the plain duty of keeping the school informed of their movements. A post card will suffice, though the Secretary is always glad to receive letters, and long letters, narrating the doings of her Old Girls.

The next step to joining an Association is wearing a badge. We decided that the badge should take the form of a brooch, and the question arose how could we combine beauty and use in an ornament which should unmistakeably proclaim the wearer to be

an Old Hulmeian. Miss Shaw most kindly stepped into the breach, and sketched designs from which we could make a choice; and while we are glad of this opportunity of offering her our most grateful thanks for her readiness to come to our help, and for the infinite pains she took in preparing the designs, we think that she has already had ample proof of our appreciation in the large number of the brooches to be seen walking about Oldham. The badge will be sent to any Old Girl on receipt of 3s. 6d.

MEETINGS IN 1911.

On Saturday July 1st thirty-nine members took train to Warburton, where they visited the interesting church. The kindly old sexton pointed out with great pride the primitive pillars of roughly squared oak beams, the old stone coffin, and the ancient yew trees in the churchyard, and told interesting stories of the church and of those who had worshipped there. We had luncheon in the garden of the toll-house by the bridge over the Ship Canal, and in the afternoon we walked to Lymm, where we spent the rest of our time in delightful shady corners by the lake.

On October 4th a special committee meeting was called at which it was decided to issue an annual Record. A scheme of country membership was instituted, by which those who are unable for any cause to attend meetings shall, on payment of an annual subscription of 1s., receive the Record and all notices of meetings. Should any country member chance to be able to attend a meeting, she will be heartily welcomed, and we hope that country members will become full members as soon as it is possible for them to do so.

Thursday December 5th was Speech Day this year, consequently we held our Winter Meeting on the previous evening. Eighty-one members were present, and progressive games proved highly entertaining. The prize, which was a small rose-bowl was won by M. Crompton. Many useful garments were sent in for the Hulme Charity.

NOTES.

As all our earliest members know, the school was opened in 1895 under Miss Foxall, who laid its foundations wisely and well on lines which enabled it in a short time to take its place among the other High Schools of the country. She left us at Easter 1898 to be married to the Rev. S. Walton, Rector of S. John's, March,

where in the busy life of home and parish, she finds time to sit on the governing body of three county secondary schools, and her Oldham friends need no assurance that she is a much valued member of that Poard.

Miss Bott, who was one of the first mistresses, was obliged to resign her post in 1904, in order to be with her mother who was in failing health. She afterwards joined the staff of a municipal school in Sheffield, where she remained till her marriage.

Miss Semmens, since she left Oldham, has been Science Mistress at St. Leonard's School, St. Andrews, and at the Simon Langton School, Canterbury. She is now visiting Science Mistress at a large school in Folkestone.

Miss Fox left us for a time to study at Aberystwith. Owing to a serious breakdown in health she was compelled to give up her work at the University, and to resign her post here. She has since taught at the Retford High School, at Penzance County School,

and at Sydenham L.C.C. School.

Miss Kerly, also one of the original mistresses, left in 1901 for a post in the Oxford High School. At the end of a year she was awarded the Gilchrist Travelling Scholarship which she used to study the teaching of history and literature in America. On her return to England she was appointed Head Mistress of the County School, Tunbridge Wells, which she left last year for the Head Mistress-ship of the large and well-endowed Coborn School for Girls in London.

Miss Hugon, who took Miss Semmens' place in January, 1899, three years later accepted the post of Science Mistress in the North London Collegiate School for Girls. From there she became Head Mistress of the Municipal Secondary School, Cardiff.

After eleven years work here, Miss Ellis left us in 1909 to become Head Mistress of the Brighton Secondary School; and in the following year, Miss Strange, who had been nine years with us, joined her as her Second Mistress.

Miss Richards, who joined this staff at Easter, 1900, in 1905 was appointed Mistress of Method in the Armstrong College of Durham University. She was greatly interested in the training of elementary teachers, and we congratulate those of our girls who may in the future be accepted as students in the Stockwell Training College, for last Christmas, Miss Richards was chosen to be its Principal.

Miss Walker, who came in September 1905, left us in July, 1910, to spend some time at home before her marriage with Dr. Robison, lecturer in chemistry at University College, Nottingham.

The First Form were much grieved to say good-bye to Miss Harwood, who was obliged to exchange her work here for that of a London school in order that she might live at home. She is now very busy at King Alfred's School, Hampstead.

Miss Salaman, who took Miss Gwynne's place as history mistress during her illness, is now at the Municipal Secondary

School, Coventry.

Nellie Neild, after three years at Lady Margaret Hall, Oxford. is one of the very few women who have gained a First-Class in the Final Honours School of Modern History. We need not tell our readers that, were she a man, this examination would qualify her for the M.A. Degree of Oxford. An M.A., however, she is, for during her first year at Oxford she took the Final Examination for the London B.A. Degree (1902), and in 1908 added to her other achievements the London M.A. in History. She gained a prize for her M.A. thesis, and her professors thought so well of it as to recommend her to print it. She also gained the Alexandra Medal of the Royal Historical Society in 1909. After her course at Oxford, her brilliant degree gained her a studentship at the Marv Datchelor Training College where she gained a First-Class in the London University examination for the Teachers' Diploma, and was then appointed Assistant Mistress at the Central Foundation School, London, which she afterwards left to become history mistress at the Sherborne School for Girls.

Alice Sergeant gained in 1901 an Entrance Scholarship at University College, Aberystwith. Six months later she was awarded an Entrance Scholarship to Somerville College, Oxford, where after three years she gained a Second-Class in the Final Honours School of Modern History, and in the same year completed the examinations for the B.A. Degree of London, with Second-Class Honours in History. From 1905-1907, she was engaged in research and secretarial work at Oxford under Professor Vinogradoff, and then went to Westfield College (London University) as Assistant Lecturer in history.

Emily Thackeray, after three years at Lady Margaret Hall, gained in 1906 a Third-Class in the Oxford Final Honours School of Modern History. After holding a post in a Bristol High School,

she went for a year to S. Mary's Training College, Paddington, from which she gained the Cambridge Teachers' Certificate.

Ellen Anderton gained a Bursary at the Entrance Examination of the Royal Holloway College in 1903, and in 1906 took the London B.Sc. Degree, and was awarded a free studentship at the Mary Datchelor Training College, obtaining in 1907 the London University Teachers' Diploma. After three years as science mistress at Wellingborough Grammar School, she became one of the science mistresses at the Manchester High School, resigning her post on her marriage last year.

May Kershaw, who matriculated at Manchester in 1904, has remained there ever since. She gained the B.Sc. Degree of Manchester in 1907, was awarded the M.Sc. on research work in Botany, was awarded a Research Scholarship in 1907, and again in 1908, was demonstrator under Professor Weiss, and is now Assistant Lecturer in Botany. She had the honour of reading a paper before the British Association last year on palæobotany.

Marjorie Martland took the Preliminary Scientific Examination for the London M.B. before leaving school in 1906 for Newnham College, Cambridge. In 1909 she gained a Second-Class in the Natural Science Tripos, and then entered the London School of Medicine for Women. At the end of her first year there, she became a demonstrator in anatomy and has been awarded the Anatomy Prize for two years in succession. In 1911 she passed the Second M.B. Examination (London University), gaining honours in anatomy and physiology.

Ada Neild spent the last two years of her school life at the Manchester High School, and gained a Scholarship from there to Owens College. In 1907 she took the the B.A. Degree of Manchester, and the following year passed the M.A. Examination with Second-Class Honours in History. A year at the Mary Datchelor Training College gained for her the London Teachers' Diploma, with distinction in the Theory of Education, and for the last three years she has been an assistant mistress at the Central Foundation School, London.

Till within the last four or five years, girls who wished to become elementary teachers were obliged to become pupil teachers at sixteen years of age, and even earlier. That is no longer necessary, and the future King's Scholar now remains at school till she is old enough to pass on to the Training College whether it be residential or a university day training college. Against the names of those who passed through the Pupil Teachers' Centre after leaving school will be seen the initials, P.T.

Ada Cockcroft, Bessie Mellodew, Phyllis Robson, and Dorothy Viner are qualified nurses.

Matilda Buckley, Annie Chadwick, Susan Trewman, Marion and Hilda Chadwick, Dorothy Stanton, and Annie Beswick are learning type-writing and shorthand.

Hannah Cocker, Sarah Fletcher, Esther Shaw, Elsie Atkins, and Marjorie Lansdell are all qualified teachers of cookery, and hold, or have held appointments under the Oldham, Chadderton. and other local authorities.

Schools for Mothers, reading to the Blind, collecting for the N.S.P.C.A., the Girls' Friendly Society, Sunday School teaching are only a few of the many things that are crying out for helpers, and to which some are turning; and we hope, as we

grow older, that some few may be found who will be able to follow the lead of two of our lady-governors, and help the social work of the town, as Poor-law Guardians or Town Councillors.
