THE OLD GIRLS' ASSOCIATION.

CONSTITUTION AND RULES.

The Society shall be called "The Old Girls' Association of the Oldham Hulme Grammar School for Girls,"

The President shall be the acting Head Mistress of the School, and the Secretary shall be one of the members of the School Staff.

The affairs of the Association shall be conducted by a Committee consisting of the President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, and sixteen representative members, of whom one shall be elected by the Staff, fourteen shall be elected by the Old Girls, and one by the members of Form Upper VI. Of the fourteen Old Girls' representatives two shall retire annually in rotation, but they shall be eligible for re-election, and the election shall take place at the December meeting.

Members who, without good cause assigned, absent themselves from Committee meetings for two consecutive years, shall be considered to have resigned, and their places shall be filled up at the December meeting at the end of the second year during which they were absent from the meetings.

Full members (i.e., girls who are able to attend the meetings) shall pay a yearly subscription of 2/-. Country members, who are not eligible to attend meetings, shall pay 1/-. Both subscriptions will include the "Record" and all notices of meetings.

All subscriptions are due in December, and may be paid at the meeting. No notices will be sent to any member whose subscription is two years in arrears.

There shall be two meetings of the Association each year—on the Tuesday preceding the School's Annual Entertainment, which is a fixture for the first Wednesday in December, and on the first Thursday in July, with the exception that in alternate years a picnic on the first Saturday in July shall take the place of the summer meeting at School.

During the last week in November each member shall send to the Secretary at least one warm, useful garment for the poor. (Old clothes are also welcome.)

The "Record" shall be issued during the Spring Term, and shall be sent to all members who have paid their subscriptions.

President are appealing to the women of the Empire to raise the sum of £100,000 to build a Sailors' Rest and Boys' Hostel in the Port of London as a permanent memorial to those splendid men of both Sea Services who have lost their lives in the service of their And what better memorial could be devised than an institution so useful to those who come after them? And as this is to be our Thank-offering we will not limit the gift to the twentyfour pennies, but will leave each member to give such expression to her gratitude as her means and other calls allow. Contributions should be sent to Miss Evington any time up to the summer meeting in July.

Now that the war is over we must think of our Honours Board. We do not want one name left out. So if any member knows of any Old Girl whose name has not yet appeared in the lists published in the Record, will she please send it to the Secretary with particulars of her work. All are qualified who have done direct war work such as V.A.D., W.A.A.C., &c., or who by taking posts in banks or offices have released men for the army, and are ready to relinquish these posts when the men come back. Remember that it is better to send in names two or three times than not at all.

Now surely we might revive our Games Clubs. Who will volunteer to join cricket and hockey clubs and to play in tennis tournaments?

An urgent appeal for probationers has reached us from Miss Hutchinson, Matron and Superintendent of Nurses at the Coventry and Warwickshire Hospital. She says: "The nursing profession is suffering badly at the present time for want of students. Of course 1 may be not altogether unbiassed, but in my opinion there is hardly a profession more fitting for girls as it tends to bring out all their womanly instincts, and the life is a very happy one."

The salaries for the Probationers for the three years are respectively £12, £18, £24, but the subject is coming up for revision shortly and the scale will probably be raised. A Staff Nurse begins at £45 and a Sister at £50, rising to £60. There is a liberal amount of free time—four hours a day, one day a week, and three weeks' holiday a year. Indoor uniform is provided after the trial month.

NOTES.

Cyril S. Walton, son of Mrs. Walton (Miss Foxall) has won an open Scholarship to Rugby of £100 a year for the period of his school life. He was one of the first three chosen out of 116 candidates.

Miss Sawyer has returned to her educational missionary work in Poona.

Marjorie Martland is one of the five surgeons on the staff of the Scottish Women's Unit at Royaumont to whom has been awarded the French Croix de Guerre with star. She has been in France two years. In recommending the awards Marshal Petain issued a regimental order stating that these doctors "have lavished at the Scottish Hospital, both at the advanced camp at Villers-Cotterets and also at Royaumont their skill and devotion to the French and Allied wounded under repeated bombardment." The hospital at Villers-Cotterets where Marjorie was second in command was very heavily shelled in the advance in May when the enemy was at Soissons only five miles away. Only with the greatest difficulty was the hospital evacuated without loss.

Margaret Maw has received honourable mention in recognition of her services as Quartermaster at Woodfield (V.A.D. Hospital) since the outbreak of the war. To both we offer our warm congratulations. Of Bertha Martland's silver badge we are also intensely proud, but with a loving sympathy seeing that it is given for disablement in her country's service.

Madge Newton joined the W.R.A.F. in July, 1918, and was posted to a large Aircraft Repair Depôt near Sheffield. She acted chiefly as Quartermaster and officer of sports. In August she was transferred to Salisbury.

Winifred Cooper joined the Q.M.A.A.C. and went to France in September. She was sent home on sick leave, and is now Kindergarten Mistress at the Eustace Street Council School, Chadderton.

Marjorie Brearley is also in the Q.M.A.A.C. as Sergeant, training recruits at Chadderton.

Lillian Neild has gained the diploma of the C.M.B. (Central Midwives' Board), and is now working as a district nurse at Woolwich. She is very happy in her work which she describes as thrilling. She says that nurses are urgently needed, and that it is impossible to estimate the amount of suffering that can be prevented if only this kind of nursing is not left in the hands of unskilled, ignorant women.
