THE OLD GIRLS' ASSOCIATION.

CONSTITUTION AND RULES.

The Society shall be called The Old Girls' Association of the Oldham Hulme Grammar School for Girls.

The President shall be the acting Head Mistress of the School, and the Secretary shall be one of the members of the School Staff.

The affairs of the Association shall be conducted by a Committee consisting of the President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, and sixteen representative members, of whom one shall be elected by the Staff, fourteen shall be elected by the Old Girls, and one by the members of Form Upper VI. Of the fourteen Old Girls' representatives two shall retire annually in rotation, but they shall be eligible for re-election, and the election shall take place at the December meeting.

Members who, without good cause assigned, absent themselves from Committee meetings for two consecutive years shall be considered to have resigned, and their places shall be filled up at the December meeting at the end of the second year during which they were absent from the meetings.

Full members (i.e., girls who are able to attend the meetings) shall pay a yearly subscription of 3/-. Country members, who are not eligible to attend meetings, shall pay 2/-. Both subscriptions will include the Record.

All subscriptions are due in December, and may be paid at the meeting. No notices will be sent to any member whose subscription is two years in arrears.

There shall be two meetings of the Association each year—at the beginning of December, and on the first Thursday in July, with the exception that in alternate years a picnic on the first Saturday in July shall take the place of the summer meeting at School.

During the last week in November each member shall send to the Secretary at least one warm, useful garment for the poor. Clothing that has been worn, if it is in good condition, is also acceptable.

The Record shall be issued during the Spring Term, and shall be sent to all members who have paid their subscriptions.

May 1895, the date of the opening of the Hulme Grammar School, was a landmark in the history of Oldham girlhood, and this thirtieth anniversary is a year no less memorable in the annals of the Girls' School, for on May 21st we celebrate the completion and the official opening of the new buildings for which we have so long hoped and waited.

In 1895, the school, planned for one hundred and fifty girls, opened with seventy; during the thirty years of its existence the number of pupils has risen to two hundred and twenty-five; it will be some time, of course, before we reach the limit of three hundred for which the new school provides.

Lord Crawford has accepted the invitation of the Governors to perform the opening ceremony. It will not be possible, for the obvious reason of lack of space, to invite all the Old Girls, as we should have liked. In order that they may be properly represented, however, invitations will be sent to all members of the Old Girls' Committee.

Miss Bailey proposes to institute an annual Founders' Day, the first to be held on May 20th, the thirtieth anniversary of the opening of the School. There will be a Commemoration Service in the morning, and in the afternoon tea at School to which Miss Bailey intends to invite all Old Girls whom we can reach, so that those who are able to come will have the privilege of a private view or dress rehearsal before the admission of the general public. Take note of the date—May 20th—and try to keep it disengaged.

For the benefit of those who live too far away to take part in any of these opening ceremonies, or even to hope to see the School for a very long time, we venture to give a very simple description of the new building.

The site it occupies is that once spare piece of ground between our end of the old building and College Road. Imagine a building three storeys high, of red brick, obviously intended rather for use than ornament, and having no great pretentions to architectural beauty. The front, its longest side, faces Frederick Street. The old main entrance remains, there is a new entrance for the girls near the College Road end, and there we will go in. On our right is the dining room, a little larger than the old recreation room and occupying the whole of the end which faces College Road. Turning to the left a few yards from the entrance, we find a corridor which joins the old one at the bottom of the old stairs; on the left of it are the new cloak rooms. on the right the kitchens, boiler house, &c. We will go up the old stairs and stand at the door of the Head Mistress's room, there we find the old corridor extended eastward nearly as far again, and passing down it we see on the left a large class room, to be called the sewing room, the new hall-gymnasium, lighted by four large mullioned windows facing Windsor Road, the roof being after the design of that of the old hall. On the right of the corridor are four class rooms overlooking our playgrounds, and at the end occupying the space over the dining room are the physics laboratory and a class room. Between the hall and that end class room is the new staircase. The old staircase is also carried up to the top floor. Mounting it we find a music room over the girls' old entrance, the doctor's room over the Head Mistress's room, a small waiting room over the main entrance, and another corridor with the same number of class rooms as below, and at the end, the chemistry laboratory and a class room, the latter already taking shape as the library and sixth form room. Over the sewing room is the new art room or studio.

We have then ten new class rooms, art room, sewing room, laboratories, gymnasium, much better cloak rooms, new dining room and kitchens. I must not forget the luxury of hot water taps to all the basins! The upstairs cloak room is being altered into the new staff room, and the old one will be used as a secretary's office and book room. The staff cloak room is enlarged by the addition of the girls' dressing room next to it.

The hall is already in use for morning assembly and prayers, and later in the day for drill and dancing, and we occupy some of the class rooms, so that we are already beginning to feel the joy of

ownership and the satisfaction of sole proprietorship.

One very interesting relic is incorporated in the new building, though it is rather out of sight. Through the kindness and foresight of some of the Governors one of the doors of the Old Grammar School in Peter Street was secured when that building

was pulled down recently. It is built into the north side of the school, the expenses of removal being defrayed by private subscription. Two old mullioned windows should have come with it, but the stones had crumbled so badly that it was feared they would only be a constant source of trouble through damp. Carved in a stone over the doorway are the initials J.A. (James Assheton), and the date 1611.

You Old Girls may miss the old haunts, but if there are changes in externals, there will be none in the things that matter; you will rejoice with the new generation in the additional advantages that are theirs, and you will not fail to find the same old welcome in the new building, so that in time you will come to feel as much at home there as you were in the older building.

The Old Girls' gift to the building fund has reached the sum of just over £200. That is not enough to pay for a class room or a library, but there remain many wants—nay needs—to supply which we cannot look to the general fund. And may I say here that if any Old Girl has had good intentions in regard to this fund which she has not yet translated into good deeds, it is not too late. Nettie Macpherson will be only to pleased to receive any sum, great or small (the greater the better naturally), which happy memories of school days, or a sense of benefit received, or sound learning acquired may prompt her to send. This fund will not be spent without consulting the wishes of the Old Girls. One suggestion is that an asphalt or dry playground of some sort, partly covered in perhaps for use in bad weather, should be made on the ground still left between the building and College Road. Any other suggestions would receive consideration, of course.

The Old Girls' Association is now to have its own blazer as well as badge; to be entitled to wear either one must be a member of the O.G.A. The subject of the blazer was discussed at the last winter meeting with the following result:—the blazer is to be dark navy blue, the pocket to bear the Hulme crest worked in gold wire above the Assheton shield, the stripes of which will be in thick corded ribbon strongly recommended for its good wearing qualities, a narrow line of gold wire between each stripe and round the shield, and the school motto, also in gold wire, two

words on each side of the lion's head.

We have made arrangements with Messrs. Cole and Son, 2, Moult Street, Cross Street, Manchester, to supply the blazer. It can be had in two qualities according to the use individual members may wish to make of it. The patterns supplied are good material, a union cloth, and an all wool, costing respectively 23/6 and 33/6 the coat. The embroidered pocket will cost 11/6 more, so that the coat complete will cost 35/- or 45/-. We have no

doubt at all that the blazer will be generally approved.

Messrs. Cole & Son will not supply the coat without the presentation of an order form signed by the O. G. Secretary, so that all intending purchasers must apply to me for this permit, and the sooner they do so the better for them, for a reduction in price of 2/- a coat will be made to those placing their order before May 9th.

Badges, price 5/-, may be had from the Secretary.

The summer meeting will be a picnic about which notices will be sent out in due course.

The Editor's pathetic annual appeal for news to publish in the Record does not get the response it deserves. Her note book is always close at hand for jottings, post cards cost only one penny, and The Hulme Grammar School for Girls is not an address that slips one's memory.
