THE OLD GIRLS' ASSOCIATION.

CONSTITUTION AND RULES.

The Society shall be called the Old Girls' Association of the Oldham Hulme Grammar School for Girls.

The President shall be the acting Head Mistress of the School, and the Secretary shall be one of the members of the School Staff.

The affairs of the Association shall be conducted by a Committee consisting of the President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, and sixteen representative members, of whom one shall be elected by the Staff, fourteen shall be elected by the Old Girls, and one by the members of Form Upper VI. Of the fourteen Old Girls' representatives two shall retire annually in rotation, but they shall be eligible for re-election, and the election shall take place at the December meeting.

Members who, without good cause assigned, absent themselves from committee meetings for two consecutive years shall be considered to have resigned, and their places shall be filled at the December meeting at the end of the second year during which they were absent from the meetings.

Full members (i.e., those who are able to attend the meetings) shall pay a yearly subscription of 3s. Country members, who are not eligible to attend meetings, shall pay 2s. Both subscriptions include the Record.

All subscriptions are due in December, and may be paid at the meeting. No notices will be sent to any member whose subscription is two years in arrears.

There shall be two meetings of the Association each year—at the beginning of December, and on the first Thursday in July, with the exception that in alternate years a picnic shall take the place of the summer meeting at School.

During the last week in November each member shall send to the Secretary at least one warm, useful garment for the Hulme Charity. Clothing that has been worn if it is in good condition is acceptable.

The Record shall be issued during the spring term, and shall be sent to all members who have paid their subscriptions.

Miss Evington's Farewell

July 19th, 1929.

If Miss Evington had retired from the O.G.A. as well as from the staff at the end of last Summer Term, words would fail to express our dismay, and we should break down into a mere wail of regret.

Then we all retired to consume the most scrumptious refreshments specially provided by the Committee; but we had lumps in our throats and couldn't enjoy our trifle thinking how shaken Evie must be feeling, though she was putting a brave face on it, as was always her way in times of

trial.

After that we settled down in the new Hall (so strange in the eyes of most of us I fear), and Miss Bailey presided, with her unfailing tact and charm, over a Ceremony of Presentation and Farewell. Four of us, representing pupils of different ages and types, spoke of our schooldays with Evie, paying tribute in our various ways to a beloved and inspiring teacher. Then Susan Rothwell, who was in Miss Evington's Form when she joined the staff, and has never broken contact, made a presentation in the name of the Old Girls' Association. There was a cheque for £124 10s. 0d. in a leather notecase beautifully designed and made by Alice Watson (Mrs. Lees), there was a tea-trolley for the new home; there was a book with our unworthy names inscribed in it. We must all have shared an uneasy feeling that these were small things compared with all that she has done for us, and richly earned. But Evie rose and made us a fine sensible speech, just like herself, setting aside her emotion for the sake of us all, and striking as if by instinct the right note of thankfulness for

the past and cheerfulness for the future.

Then we joined together in a great circle and sang "Auld Lang Syne," as we had never sung it before. And so we took leave of a dear and respected teacher; but our old friend still remains with her Old Girls, the friend of all and the connecting link between those of different eras who can hardly know each other but know her and come back, year after year, to greet her. THE PICNIC.

We visited the church and the old Norman porch dating from about 1190 set a little back from the church; in the church-yard we saw also the fragments of an old Saxon cross with its runic carving, carefully preserved under glass. Opposite the church is the picturesque Old Priests' House, a beautiful

black and white building.

From Prestbury we went to Gawsworth, by some considered one of the prettiest spots in Cheshire. The church is prettily reflected in the fishponds and sheltered by a grove of fine trees; it contains curious monuments to members of the Fitton family. Opposite the Church is the Rectory, and, near by, Gawsworth Old Hall, two fine examples of the black and white buildings for which Cheshire is famous.

Our main objective, however, was Moreton Old Hall, quite one of the most interesting half timber houses in the country. To enter, we crossed the most which completely surrounds the hall, pass under the old gatehouse, and find ourselves in the courtyard where no one could fail to be struck by the two remarkable and very beautiful bay windows surmounted by gables. There is a quaintly carved inscription above one of them "Richarde Dale Carpeder made this window by the Grace of God." We passed through the great hall with its treasures of old

furniture and pewter to the wainscoted rooms beyond where tea was served. We fetched our milk from the dairy and our bread and butter from the big kitchen where we saw the great spice chest and an ancient table. We looked into the tiny Chapel, perhaps the oldest part of the building, and we mounted to the gallery or ballroom where they say that Good Queen Bess danced. We made friends with the dogs, and took many photos one of which, was a group taken and afterwards enlarged by Miss Mitchell.

On our way back we drew up for a few moments at Astbury. It was too late to see the interior of the Church, so we had to be satisfied with seeing the weather-worn effigy of a departed Brereton in the church yard, and buying sweets at the

village shop.

The return journey was not without incident; we were held up in a rather narrow lane by a collision which had just happened between a 'bus and a motor cycle. The cycle was in a parlous state indeed, but luckily nobody was hurt, for its owners (it was a lover and his lass), were spending a quiet interlude in an adjoining field when the crash occurred. We wondered how they would get home, for the cycle was quite out of commission.

We reached Oldham about 9 p.m. without mishap, and with the memory of a very delightful day. Was it "the nicest picnic we have had"? That is the verdict generally passed on each one

as it comes.

THE WINTER MEETING.

When the Committee met to arrange the programme for the winter meeting, the voting was unanimous for a play, so Olive Garfitt with her usual readiness to help the cause in however trying a capacity, was persuaded to undertake the arduous and worrying task of producing the said play and finding members willing and able to enact the various rôles. The play was "The Custom House," by Leopold Montague, a happy choice, as the five or six principal parts were nearly the same length and required about the same histrionic ability. Olive had certainly cast the play admirably considering the few people available. Let me remark in passing that the Committee would be very pleased to have the names of any members interested in acting, so roll up, budding Sybil Thorndikes and Gracie Fields! There was only one month to prepare everything and all the cast were busy folk, so it was hardly suprising that the play resolved itself at times into a duologue between prompter and actor. The audience made due

allowance for these shortcomings and enjoyed the performance

thoroughly.

The story concerns Mr. and Mrs. Young (J. Rye & W. Holt) who are returning from their honeymoon spent in Belgium. The wife is very loth to pay duty on the lace and scent she has bought, so she packs these things together with her husband's tobacco, and dresses the result as a baby in long clothes very cleverly constructed by the property master (Alice Lees). The young couple are offered milk and motherly advice by Mrs. Brimblecombe, (P. Jackson), the baby is rescued and soothed with tender songs and words of endearment by Aunt Tryphena (L. Garfitt), sat upon by Mr. Crabbe (S. Rothwell), and finally falls to pieces in the Custom House when in the possession of Aunt Tryphena, who is arrested for smuggling. However, all comes right in the end and another pair Mr. Cotfield (D. Newton) and Miss Montrevor (N. Walton) are united. Other parts very well done were Chalker, a Custom House Officer (E. Kelsall), who also made one appearance as a porter, a Dutch passenger and a maid, both played by G. Dawson. Things had to move speedily to get through the three acts in time, and one rude member of the audience remarked that "the scene shifters were excellent anyway." Supper, the usual elections and Auld Lang Syne very nicely finished the evening.

THE SOIRÉE.

A Soirée is defined as "an evening party for friendly intercourse, accompanied by refreshments," and the one on Feb. 21st, organised by the joint committees of the O.G.A. and O.B.A. filled these conditions so well that anyone who did not find something to suit his individual taste must be hard to please.

For once the weather was kind, and we passed dry and

intact through the breezy portals of the H.G.S.

Proceeding to the IIall we were received by the two

Presidents, Miss Bailey and Mr. Hubert Hirst.

The fare provided was so good that it was difficult to choose whether to stay for the concert or to hurry off to the "Wanglers" in the Girls' Hall. That clever company, composed mainly of Old Hulmeians, gave a one-act play "Holed out in One," which was received with great enthusiasm, though old girls in the front rows were a little alarmed by Mr. Broadbent's stage golf, and trembled for the fate of their footlights if not their faces.

Meanwhile, in the concert, Reginald Whitehead, John Chantler and "Stainless Stephen" of B.B.C. fame were delighting

another party.

The two former, whose vocal talents were enhanced by some remarkably effective eye-play (quite wasted in wireless), sang magnificently, while Stainless Stephen, who possesses a most astonishing supply of breath, sang songs and reeled off amusing patter, aptly hitting off masters and old boys to the great enjoyment of their friends. Keeping the scholastic nature of the establishment well in mind, he showed a great partiality for French and chemical formulæ, real and original.

Scientific experiments in the laboratories and parlour games supplied other diversions, which many like myself were unable to

see through lack of time.
