Headmaster's Report 1986-87

It is difficult in a few short paragraphs to do justice to the many and varied activities that are part and parcel of the school year, it is indeed only when a report of this nature is compiled that the full range of activities becomes a little clear.

I begin with what, in more than one sense, is the end: the school's successes in public examinations last summer. At the Advanced Level of the GCE examination there were some excellent individual results, which are set out on other pages of this programme. Our best boys achieved maximum success: grade A in every subject, together with a Distinction on the two Special papers allowed. No less than eight boys achieved grade As in four subjects (or more). Fifty-three boys out of sixty entered Higher Education, including eight who obtained places at Oxford or Cambridge. Nevertheless I, and my staff, feel equally pleased at the more modest successes at Advanced Level of boys who had struggled lower down the school but who were never abandoned by their teachers and eventually won through. In the end, the average number of A level passes per student was 3.2, a remarkable achievement.

At the Ordinary Level (the last time it will be possible to mention this exam) there were again some excellent individual performances while the year as a whole has every right to be proud of its success. No boy finished the year "empty-handed" and the average number of 'O' level passes per boy was 8.2, which established a record as far as I am able to discover. I must stress also that this figure represents the average of every boy in the fifth form; it is our policy to ensure that all of our boys are entered for a full range

of examination subjects.

The most striking curriculum development in the year was of course the beginning of the new courses for the GCSE, the examination which has generated so much publicity in the media over the last few years. By this time next year, we shall know the best or the worst about the new examinations.

I must pay tribute to the excellent careers advice which is given to the school, not only by the Careers Master (Mr. Heale in 1986-87) but also by Mr. Baker as Head of the Sixth Form and indeed by the Form Masters of the 5th and 6th forms. In these troubled times, it is worthy of note that, to the best of my knowledge, only one boy who left school last summer is not either fully employed or continuing his education.

I should like also to take this opportunity to thank publicly those companies and organisations who assist our boys with Work Experience – there were no less than 66 of these last year, who found placements for 97 of our sixth

formers.

Before leaving the academic side of school life, I should put on record the achievements of boys who have taken part in external competitions during the year. Richard Lord and Nicholas Jackson were the most successful team from the North West in the Physics Olympiad held in London last spring, coming 20th and 82nd respectively in the whole country, and thus coming close to the achievement of two years ago, when the Hulme team actually won the contest. A Hulme team also won the Oldham Public Speaking Competition (coming 1st, 2nd and 3rd), and we were only narrowly defeated in

the finals of the "Chemquiz 87" competition organised by the Royal Society

of Chemistry for the whole of the North West.

Not all external activities organised by the teaching staff are competitive, however. A wide range of expeditions, visits and field trips took place last year: 20 theatre visits; five major historical expeditions; major and minor Biology field trips: Geographical expeditions: visits to universities: an Art exhibition mounted at Ferranti's in the summer; visits to Austria in 1986 and France (for skiing) in 1987, as well as shorter excursions to the Isle of Man. the Peak District and numerous museums and galleries in the country. In addition to these activities, fitted into the busy teaching schedule of the Main School, the boys in the Prep. School have been taken on eight theatre and concert visits and have also made numerous expeditions to places of interest in England as well as an Easter visit to Greece.

In the musical field, the school continues to flourish under the excellent direction of Mr. Baty. Over 200 boys in the Prep. School and Main School have instrumental tuition on a complete range of musical instruments. During the year, over 50 boys passed Associated Board graded examinations up to, and including, the dizzy heights of Grade 8 and I should like to record my appreciation of the work done by the visiting music teachers and especially

the work of Mr. Woodward in the Prep. School.

Many concerts were held during the year within the school involving the orchestra, the choir, the wind ensemble and the brass group as well as external performances by these groups in schools and churches of the district. The year was brought to a fitting close with the Annual Music Festival, which produced a number of very fine solo performances. I should also like to commend the excellent standard reached and maintained by the Chamber Choir under Mr. Curtis's direction.

The major event of the year, however, was the performance of H.M.S. Pinafore in March, a joint venture with the Girls' School which involved a huge output of time and effort by a large number of boys, girls and staff, in particular Mr. Baty, Mrs. Greer, Mr. Aldred, Mr. Galloway, Mr. Sheer and, as producer, Mr. Boocock. The result was an excellent performance, enjoyed by a maximum audience at each night.

The year's sporting activities were once more affected by the weather and by the difficulty of arranging fixtures with local schools. Nevertheless, a wide programme of events took place during the year in a variety of sports.

The soccer teams, while not perhaps representing a vintage year, acquitted themselves well; and the success of the teams in the middle of the school show that the best is yet to come. The same is true of the cricket teams; the under 14 XI were the most successful, reaching the semi-final of the County

Championship.

Athletics competitions with other schools are increasingly difficult to arrange, especially as examinations continue to cut into what is always a short season. The peak of the season, therefore, has to be our own Sports Day which this year had to be restricted to track events as a result of the poor weather. Success, therefore, is individual, and the school is fortunate in having G. Dennis and N. J. Auchterlonie at the Senior level and R. P. Scholes at the Junior level, as athletes of national stature.

Table-tennis and swimming are at the moment the most successful sports. In the former, we won the under-16, under-13 and under-11 Greater Manchester tournaments, while the Prep. School team were the North West Area Champions. In the latter, Hulme swimming teams have been virtually unbeaten all year at every level except the Senior, where we were 2nd in the Oldham Schools Championship.

No other sports have been played competitively on a regular basis, but both hockey and cross-country running are part of the variety offered to our boys, while the opening of the Sports Hall at the end of the year offered a tantalising glimpse of things to come. Already, senior boys have begun to develop skills in badminton and basketball which they were unaware of last

year.

I must express my appreciation here of the valuable assistance given to the development of sport in the school not only by Mr. Clegg and Mr. Wood of the Games staff, but also by a very large number of the other members of staff who help to look after teams, referee matches or assist with games

lessons. Without them, sport at Hulme would be much poorer.

A wide range of clubs and societies were run during the year, including a flourishing Cinema Club and a Debating Society, but without doubt the largest and most popular of the voluntary organisations within the school was the Combined Cadet Force, under Major Coulton, the Commanding Officer, and Lt. Galloway and Flt. Lt. Melican. Total strength of the force was 125 cadets at the start of the year: indeed recruitment is likely to have to be limited only by the need to recruit more officers. Nevertheless, despite the shortage of officers, no less than 16 courses, visits, camps or exercises were organised during the year and the biennial inspection by Group Captain G. H. Rolfe, on May 6th was a great success.

I could not end this section of my report without mentioning the excellent standard of the School Magazine under Mr. Reid's editorship. The edition which appeared at the beginning of this term contained a great deal of the information which I am attempting to set out here, but in a much more

graphic form than any words could possibly manage.

As always, there were minor changes during the year in furniture, fittings and decoration, all of which in their way have contributed towards improving the school. More importantly, all the boys in the Senior school are now equipped with modern metal lockers for the security of their books and possessions.

Above all, of course, the event of the year was the opening of the new Sports Hall on June 20th by the School's patron, The Lord Clitheroe of Downham. It is a fitting conclusion to the appeal which has been running for so long and a facility of which the school can rightly be proud.

I should like to thank the Parents' Association here not only for their invaluable help with the Sports Hall Appeal, but for their continued generosity in providing gifts for the school during the year, including musical instru-

ments for the Main School and a multi-gym for the Sports Hall.

I should like to thank the School Governors, also, for their unfailing support for the school. We are fortunate indeed to have such men and women who, while not directly involved in the day to day running of the school, yet have the interests of the school very much at heart.

As always, we hailed new members of staff and have said farewell to many familiar faces. Mr. Wilkinson and Mr. Underwood left after only a short time with us. Dr. Ashworth left after three years and Mr. Cooper after five years. We wish all of them well in the future. I should like also to pay tribute to David Ward, my predecessor, who left us at Christmas last year. Although he had only been Headmaster for six years (a short time in the history of Hulme's Headmasters) he had made many radical changes and did more than most to turn the school into the successful institution that it is. I am very conscious that I still walk in the steps that he made and I wish him well in his new post in Glasgow. With sadness, we said farewell this summer to three men who were retiring from active life in the school. Mr. Philip Heale finally left his post of Careers Master this summer, having previously been a teacher of Economics since 1968. Mr. Ronald Walpole, the School's Bursar, left after 24 years with the school, during which time he had helped to steer the school safely through a number of difficult problems. Finally, after no less than 38 years in the school, Mr. Hugh Shuttleworth retired from his post as Deputy Headmaster. Of him it may be said with absolute sincerity that the school will not be the same place without him. We wish all three men a long and happy retirement.

Inevitably, however, the school goes on, and this September we have welcomed to the school Mr. Bray, Mrs, Taylor, Mrs, Greenan, Mr. Sharples, Mr. Milne and Mr. Hulme and we hope that they all enjoy their time with us. We are also pleased to have had with us for much of the year Mr. Foxcroft, who has "stood in" for Mr. Collier of the Maths department, to whom

we wish a speedy recovery from a long illness.

We welcome also the new Bursar, Mr. David Moore, whose arrival has coincided with the most radical change in school salary structures for very many years. I am pleased also to report that some familiar faces now appear in unfamiliar roles, following some "re-shuffling" of the staff. In particular, Mr. Andrew Baker, former Head of Sixth Form, is now Deputy Headmaster and Mr. Robert Clegg, for many years the Games Master, is now responsible for careers. We wish these men, and many others whose responsibilities have

changed or increased, the greatest success in their new roles.

I began this report with our Public Examination results, and it is right that I should do so, because in the eyes of most people (including the boys themselves), these results are the most important end product of the school. Nevertheless, we must always bear in mind that education means "bringing-out"; not just bringing out a boy's capacity for passing exams, but bringing out talent in art, music, drama and sport; bringing out civilised values and civilised modes of behaviour; bringing out a capacity for leadership in a wide variety of areas and a sense of responsibility that marks a young man out as being a cut above the others, even when the others have good exam results, too. It is in these areas that the school fulfils the aims of its original founder, James Assheton. "Virtuous education in learning and good manners" are indeed of "inestimable benefit to the commonwealth" and, I would add, not a bad start in life for the boy himself.
